# Dear Co-workers and Friends of the Medical Section,

On the night of the turn of the year, more than a thousand people took part in around 50 events to commemorate the burning down of the first Goetheanum. The brightly illuminated building could be seen from afar, and all the historically significant places on the campus were accessible, from the little house of the stenographer Helene Finck, where Rudolf Steiner experienced decisive moments in the early morning of the night of the fire, to the room of the Representative of Humanity, where Michaela Glöckler gave a talk on Novalis at 6am. A class lesson held by Matthias Girke at 7am and the New Year's address by Gerald Häfner, Head of the Section for Social Sciences, enhanced the programme. Later that New Year's morn-

ing, five representatives of the Goetheanum Leadership spoke on the future and research impulses of the School. This was preceded in the last days of 2022 by a special and moving conference on the impulses of the first Goetheanum, the events of the night of the fire and the metamorphosis of the first Goetheanum into the second.

Today, 100 years later, we are living in a challenging time of crisis worldwide. The outlook on the future of many people is, not without reason, marked by sombre fears, and on this soil anxiety and polarising tendencies are, on the one hand, growing. On the other hand, positive, promising impulses and new initiatives are developing in Anthroposophic Medicine.

## How do we shape the relationship between microcosm and macrocosm?—One Health

An essential insight of recent years has been to take the relationship between microcosm and macrocosm even more seriously, also in the anthroposophical movement. At the establishment of biodynamic agriculture in Koberwitz (PL) at Whitsun 1924, Rudolf Steiner pointed out the importance of biodiversity and the creation of an ecological balance in the relationship between animals, plants and soils.¹ Human health, on the other hand, was very clearly described by Rudolf Steiner and Ita Wegman in 1925 as the balance of the human being's constitutional elements, and healing as the correction of any imbalance.² Both correspond with each other: "In nature, in the being of the world in general, everything interacts with each other".³

The Covid pandemic is related to an extremely problematic human interaction with the animal kingdom, with the living earth: human destruction of nature and perhaps also risky medical laboratory research have arguably contributed decisively to the jump of the SARS-CoV-2 virus to humans. In general, there is a growing awareness of the interdependence of human health and the health of animals, plants, soils, water, air and the earth's warmth envelope. It is important to consciously take up this responsibility, which is why the Section for Agriculture and the Medical Section of the School of Spiritual Science at the Goetheanum have entered into closer collaboration.

In principle, this realisation has lived in anthroposophy for a century; the global public is only gradually becoming aware of it. Terms such as "One Health" or "Planetary Health" stand as scientific terms for this maturing insight and were the subject of our annual conference in 2021, several articles, and most recently also the topic of Witten/Herdecke University's Summer Academy in 2022. Personal contact with leading researchers in this field has shown us respect for a different view of the world and humanity, coupled with a critical awareness of the one-sidedness of a purely positivist scientific approach.<sup>4</sup> From a Section per-

spective, we see an opportunity here to introduce an independently extended concept of the health of humans and the earth into the developing "mainstream" and to show in the form of "best practice" that we have already been practising this in our approaches for decades, for example in our efforts towards an ecologically balanced farm organism and an "anthroposophical lifestyle", described in the scientific literature, which includes the cultivation of a spiritual relationship with the world and has already proved to be beneficial for children's health.<sup>5</sup>

We will devote our <u>Research Conference</u> next March to this topic and ask the questions about the nature and exploration of life.

Concerns and misunderstandings have arise in the medical and general anthroposophical movement over this crucial topic. The fact that veterinary medicine, the protection of animals and humans against infection, often through vaccination programmes, and the fear of animal-fattening driven antibiotic resistance played an important role at the cradle of the concept of "One Health", when the term was coined, should not obscure the fact that the One Health approach is rapidly evolving. Thus the leading Swiss One Health expert Prof Dr med vet Jakob Zinsstag, who has also given an authentic account of the history of this approach, writes 6 on the practice of a One Health project in Guatemala: "But we also realised how important it is to give patients the choice as to their healthcare without pushing them into a conflict of loyalties between different medical systems. In this way, their spiritual, psychological and physical health needs can at the same time be better addressed."7

However, there is also the concern that in the concrete implementation of the One Health approach, strong, globally organised private interests dominate, whereas originally the guiding idea was that the respective participants in a community, a region ("stakeholder approach") jointly agree on health-promoting agriculture, medicine, education, landscape conservation, etc. A recent publication in *The Lancet* on the topic clearly addresses the issue of equity in the implementation of One Health concepts, where the law that might is right must not apply.<sup>8</sup>

When the Medical Section refers to the One Health approach, it is concerned with the relationship between human beings and the kingdoms of nature, that is, with the central topic of microcosm and macrocosm. This is about a positive concept of health in the sense of a self-regulated equilibrium, as it was fundamentally developed by Rudolf Steiner for both medicine and agriculture.

An important contribution in this field has been developed by our anthroposophical colleague Machteld Huber with her "Positive Health" concept (https://www.iph.nl/) which she presented at the 2022 annual conference. Human autonomy, the need for independence, self-efficacy, meaning and spiritual orientation play a central role in this — as does, on the other hand, the ability to self-regulate and adapt to the respective living conditions.

Is it not our common desire to contribute to a positive, comprehensive understanding of the health of people and the earth? How do we properly relate the individual aspect of health to the fact that health does not exist privately, but that healthy development also depends on the interaction of all living beings and the social circumstances of life? How do we help to shape the world as it develops and what openness and lack of preconceptions are necessary for this? On the other hand, where is it necessary to realistically recognise the influence of powerful political and private sector interests and to behave in the appropriately critical way? As everywhere in medicine, we are most likely to make positive contributions here too through "best practice" examples and joint research projects, while at the same time strengthening and developing our own identity.

## International Study Days for Anthroposophic Arts Therapies

At the beginning of 2023, for the first time after the pandemic and for the twenty-third time in total, the art therapy conference took place, addressing the topic of courage: 140 participants from the various professional disciplines addressed the topic from various perspectives. Thus, for example, the perspective of paediatrics was given just as much space as that from the work with prisoners in the penal system, and workshops dealt with both philosophical and very practical aspects such as body work or speech therapy, in order to make "courage" more tangible from all sides and with all senses.

## Anthroposophic perioperative medicine

In January 2023, a symposium of the Anthroposophic Perioperative Medicine Working Group of the Medical Section took place at Herdecke Community Hospital under the title "Pain – an unavoidable companion of operative medicine?".

In hospital medicine, patients are increasingly being admitted for targeted interventions, which means that interventional medicine is becoming more and more important. What is the relevance of the medicines and therapeutic procedures of Anthroposophic Medicine in this context? It became clear during the symposium that the perioperative support of the patient requires a comprehensive therapeutic approach in order to facilitate the healing process. Anthroposophic Medicine values the positive effects of artistic therapies, body therapies, eurythmy therapy and anthroposophic medicinal products in the period before surgery and during the treatment of post-operative conditions. But spiritual questions were also discussed: how do we accompany the patient in the zone of the pre-op waiting room, that is, an area that represents a threshold of consciousness and is related to the threshold to the spiritual world? How do we strengthen forces of trust, how do we pay attention to the warmth that is so crucial in physical, mental and spiritual terms?

The dedicated working group will continue to work on this important field, which has already produced comprehensive treatment concepts.

### New medical course in England

We are very pleased about the newly started three-year course of the international English Medical Training in Anthroposophic Medicine. Around 30 people from almost 20 countries are taking part in this English-language further training course for physicians to become anthroposophical doctors. The further training teaches the basics of anthroposophy and Anthroposophic Medicine, leads to the Goethean observation of nature and teaches skills for the understanding of illness, the examination and encounter with the patient and for therapy.

#### **IKAM** retreat

At the end of January, the several-day-long annual IKAM retreat took place at the Goetheanum – that is, the meeting of all those responsible for the various coordination fields of the Medical Section. Numerous reports from the coordinators illustrated the intensive worldwide work in the professional groups.

Challenging issues were discussed such as the intense attacks on Anthroposophic Medicine (especially in Central Europe), as well as the now imminent recognition of the training curricula of Anthroposophic Medicine by the WHO.

This rounds off several years of cooperation with the Department of Traditional, Complementary and Integrative Medicine of the WHO, which has been supported and actively shaped by the IVAA (International Federation of Anthroposophic Medical Associations), all international anthroposophic medical associations and the professional coordinators. We are very grateful to the presidium — especially Dr med Tido von Schoen-Angerer and Dr med Iracema Benevides — and the staff of the IVAA. We will inform you in our newsletter when the so-called "Benchmarks for Training in Anthroposophic Medicine", that is, the worked out training criteria, will be published. Translations into several languages are already in preparation.

An important item of the IKAM retreat concerned the relationship of the Section's work with the Anthroposophical Society. Which impulses can be realised here? The CARE I (Pregnancy, Birth, Early Childhood and Living with Disability) as well as CARE V (Palliative Medicine) interdisciplinary working groups of the Medical Section are now anchored as official specialist groups in the Anthroposophical Society. We will see what further developments can be successful here.

Opening of a rehabilitation centre in Kyiv (UA): Our colleague Dr Roland Frank (AU) reports on the imminent start of work at a Ukrainian rehabilitation centre which has been set up with his support and the handson initiative of Dr Yevhen Volchenko and his team after weeks of preparation. There will be three main areas of care: physiotherapy/physical therapy, psychotherapy and emergency education. The budgeted fixed costs of 6000 euros / month for the first five months of operation have already been transferred. He has headed the Chair of Complementary Medicine in the Faculty of Health Sciences, University of Pécs since September 2017 and is a board member of the International Federation of Anthroposophic Medical Associations (IVAA). Journal Medizinisch-Pädagogische Konferenz – subscribers and authors wanted: in early 2023, the von Tessin Centre for Health and Education in Stuttgart (DE) took over as publisher. The first edition was published at the Stuttgart Waldorf School in May 1948 for teachers and school doctors. Since 2018, it has been a journal for medical, educational and therapeutic professionals and for interested parents. Peter Heusser, Johannes Weinzirl, Tom Scheffers, René Ebersbach (Eds): Erläuterungen zum ersten Ärztekurs Rudolf Steiners 1920 – Vorträge 4 und 5. Studienkommentare zum medizinischen Werk Rudolf Steiners – "Geisteswissenschaft und Medizin" (GA 312) 3. Berlin and Dornach 2023.

The present work is the third companion volume to Rudolf Steiner's (1861–1925) first course for physicians in 1920. The aim is to continue the work already done by physicians, pharmacists and other specialists and, for the first time, to systematically "flesh out" this course "in detail" in terms of spiritual and natural science. This enables today's read-

ers to have a coherent understanding of Steiner's texts and makes them more aware of the potential that still remains to be tapped.

"How do I find the right host tree for my (cancer) patient?" In the search for a rationale, the gaze turns in two directions. What is


